





Dr. Hon. Yancy Peter Flah, MA, is former Professor of History at the University of Liberia. He served as Deputy Minister for Presidential Affairs, Dean of Admissions at the University of Liberia, and the first principal for Zwedru Multilateral High School, Grand Gedeh County.



Hon. Joseph M.N. Gbadyu, MA, is former superintendent (county executive) of Grand Bassa County, Liberia. He is also former deputy minister for operation, production, and coordination at the Liberian Ministry of Internal Affairs. Hon. Gbadyu is a Bassa Language and Culture Historian, and statesman extraordinaire. He played crucial roles in the political, educational, and religious transformations of the Bassa people and Liberia in general.



Rev. J. Emmanuel Z. Bowier, MA, is an original member of the Board of Directors of LIHEDE. Former Liberian Minister of Information, Culture, and Tourism. Rev. Bowier holds a BS Degree in Sociology from the University of Liberia and a Master of Divinity from the John Wesley Seminary of the United Methodist, USA.

Mr. Syrulwa Somah, PhD, is a co-founder and executive director of LIHEDE. He is an Associate Professor of Environmental Health and Occupational Safety & Health and Coordinator of Graduate Studies at North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University, Greensboro, North Carolina. He also holds an AA in liberal studies from LaGuardia Community College in Long Island, New York; a BS in Labor Studies/Occupational Safety & Health from the State University of New York; a MSA in healthcare administration from Central Michigan University and a MLS in history and religion from the University of Oklahoma. His PhD is in policy studies with concentration on environmental and occupational health from the Union Institute & Universities in Cincinnati, Ohio. Dr. Somah is author of several books, including The Historical Resettlement of Liberia and

Its Environmental Impact; Christianity, Colonization, and State of African Spirituality, and Nyanyan Gohn-Manan: History, Migration & Government of the Bassa, a book about traditional Bassa leadership and cultural norms, one of the sixteen major ethnic groups of Liberia. Dr. Somah serves as advisor to the LIHEDE 5th anniversary jubilee planning committee.



Mr. Siahyonkron Nyanseor, MA, is co-founder and treasurer of LIHEDE. Mr. Nyanseor is a Liberian native with thirty-one years of professional public and private-sector experience in the fields of administrative management, healthcare services, human service delivery, and staff development. He taught Person Centered Planning, Mental Retardation, and Cultural Issues to new employees at Georgia Regional Hospital/Atlanta for many years, and he once served as Expert Witness at political asylum hearings in the U.S. in regard to Liberia's 14-year civil war. Mr. Nyanseor, a Mental Health Clinician and Qualified Mental Retardation Professional, is a founding member and former president of the Union of Liberian Associations in the Americas (ULAA), Inc. He is also publisher of The Perspective Internet Web magazine, and his research and writing interests fall largely within Africa, with particular focus on the history, economics, politics, sociology, ethics, and theology of

people of African-origin living in Africa and its Diaspora. Mr. Nyanseor, a poet, journalist, and cultural and political activist, holds a certificate in Ore Handling Operations, a certificate in journalism, a BSW in social administration, and MA in political science. Mr. Nyanseor heads LIHEDE 5th anniversary jubilee planning committee's sub-committee on finance.



Mr. Nat Galarea Gbessagee, MS, is co-founder and secretary general of LIHEDE. He is former director of public affairs in the Liberian Ministry of Information, Culture, and Tourism, and former Senior Information Officer at the Liberian Embassy in Washington, DC. Mr. Gbessagee's formal training and education includes print journalism, human resources, professional writing, and computer information systems. He is a well-known within the Diaspora Liberian Community in the U.S for his articles and other writings on Liberia. He is currently pursuing a PhD in Rhetoric and Technical Communication at Michigan Technological University in Michigan, focusing on composition pedagogic, cultural studies, and risk communication. He is also a member of the Advisory Board of the Center for Survivors of Torture located in Philadelphia and an affiliate of the Lutheran Church of Philadelphia, USA. He served as a member of the Advisory Board and volunteer of the Liberian Truth and Reconciliation (TRC) USA Project. Mr. Slewion heads the LIHEDE 5th anniversary jubilee Planning Committee's subcommittees on public relations.



Ret. Col. Horlin Carter, Sr., PhD, serves as African & African-American Affairs Director. He is an Associate Professor of Occupational Safety & Health at North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University, Greensboro, North Carolina. Dr. Carter has thirty-two years experience in the United States Air Force, beginning as an enlisted airman and retiring as a Colonel. He is former Deputy Director for Facilities and Distribution Management at Defense Logistics Agency at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and Transportation Squadron Commander, 145th Aerial Port Squadron, North Carolina Air National Guard, Charlotte, North Carolina. Dr. Carter also served as the Chief of Staff and Faculty Development Division (SFDD) in the Directorate of Training and Doctrine, U.S. Army, Fort Ben Harrison, Indiana, and as the Assistant Vice-Chancellor of ARISA at North Carolina A & T State University. He presently lives in Greensboro, North Carolina.



Ms. Mariah Y. Seton, PhD, was born in Harper, Maryland County, Liberia. She is the daughter of Nathaniel Seton and Lucy Toe Seton. She attended the college of West Africa High School and Konola Academy in Liberia. Dr. Seton earned two Associate Degrees from Harry Truman College, and her BS, Master's, and PhD in Administration from the Roosevelt University in Chicago, Illinois. Dr. Seton held several administrative positions in with the City of Chicago, including advocate for the disadvantaged, women, and the homeless. Dr. Seton says she believes in and cherishes LIHEDE's philosophy of giving back to the community, and describes act of giving as the best patriotic duty ever.



Mr. Augustus B. Menyongai, BA, is LIHEDE-Liberia National Coordinator. He is a former director of Liberia Watch for Human Rights Community Development Program, and former program officer of Rural Human Rights Activities Program of Liberia. Mr. Menyongai holds a BA in Religious Education from the African Methodist Episcopal University in Monrovia, and several certificates in peace building, fact-finding, monitoring and documentation in human rights, and development and leadership from amnesty international and related agencies. Mr. Joseph T-G Gbaba, Sr., Ed.D., is General Chair of the LIHEDE 2009 5th anniversary jubilee. He is an internationally-known Liberian artist/scholar, playwright, and theatre director and actor. He is former Acting Deputy Minister for Culture and Tourism in the Liberian Ministry of Information, Culture, and Tourism (1992), and founder and Executive Director of Dehkontee Artists Theatre, Inc. Dr. Gbaba holds a BA in English from the University of Liberia (1980); an MFA in Theatre from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (1983), and a MS in Education (Elementary and Special Education) from St. Joseph's Jesuit University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania (2002), and a Doctorate in Educational Leadership from St. Joseph's University (2009). Dr. Gbaba has taught Literature, Drama, and Contemporary Writing at the University

of Liberia, Cuttington University, A.M.E. Zion Community College, and numerous high schools in Liberia, including St. Patrick's, St. Teresa's Convent, College of West Africa, A.M.E. Zion High School. He is also former principal of Zwedru Multilateral High School in Grand Gedeh County, Liberia.



Consul Teta Banks is vice chair of the 2009 LIHEDE 5th anniversary jubilee. He served as the Honorary Consul General of the Liberian Consulate Office in Philadelphia, USA from 1993 to 2009. She was educated at Wellesley College, Howard University, and Wayne State University the USA, and Oxford University in Great Britain. Consul Banks strongly believes that LIHEDE's efforts at creating awareness of Liberian history and education, and considers it a great honor to participate in the Jubilee, which she sees as a historic event focused on "honoring our great [Liberian] history.



Ms. Sylvestine Payne, MSW, is Jubilee Operations Manager and Program Chairperson of the Daughters of LIHEDE. She is a professional social worker, and owner and administrator of assisted living residential facilities located in Fayetteville and Jonesboro, two suburbs of Atlanta, Georgia. Ms. Payne, a graduate of Monrovia Central High School in Liberia, came to the U.S. in 1987 after spending two-years in the mass communication program at the University of Liberia. Ms. Payne eventually settled in Savanna, Georgia where she obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees in Social Work from Savannah State University. She worked as a clinical social worker with the State of Georgia in Savannah for eight years before establishing her own business in 1998. She operated her business in Savannah for close to ten years before relocating to Fayette-ville in 2007. Ms. Payne is a Christian and an active member of Speedwell United Methodist Church in Fayetteville. She serves as chairperson of the Church's social action committee and a member of the United Methodist Women. She is also an active member of the Liberian Com-

munity Association of Metropolitan Atlanta (LAMA), and serves as co-chairman of the association's board of directors. Ms. Payne is national president of her high school alumni association, and co-founder of Concern Women of Georgia, an all-female group providing recreational and social services to children living in Liberia and the Diaspora Liberian community in the U.S. Born in Yekepa, Nimba County, Liberia to parents hailing from Grand Bassa County, Liberia. Ms. Payne lived in Monrovia most of her life. She attended Cathedral High School from kindergarten to eighth grade and Monrovia Central High School from 9th grade through 12th grade.

Furthermore, Professor Nagbe holds an MA in English Education from the Glassboro (Rowan) State University in New Jersey. He is past president of the University of Liberia Faculty Association and past president of the Liberia Association of Writers. In June 1994, he was featured as an African writer on the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC). Professor Nagbe writes poetry and fiction, and has published several titles, including Nuggets of the African Novel (With Notes on the Liberian Literary Heritage), One Saturday in August, Fright and Flight (A Reflection on My Refugee Life in Ghana), Whispers, Progenies of Defiance, Sun at Midnight, Wings for the Next Day, and A Scream in the Storm. His multi-disciplinary interests include topics in education, literature, rhetoric, law, and media studies. He and his wife, Frances, live presently in the United States, where he continues to teach and write.



Mr. Thomas Madison Johnson, BA, heads LIHEDE 5th anniversary jubilee planning committee's sub-committee on social. He is assistant manager of quality assurance for liberty hardware manufacturing company in Winston Salem, North Carolina, and president and owner of Johnson Cleaning System in Greensboro, North Carolina. Mr. Johnson, a former administrative assistant to the deputy minister of administration in the Liberian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, holds a BA degree in public administration from the University of Liberia, and an AA degree in computer science from Guilford Technical College in Jamestown, North Carolina. Mr. Johnson also holds a diploma in diplomacy from the Liberian Foreign Service Institute in Monrovia, and he plans to resume in the near future his MBA studies (marketing major) at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, which he had to interrupt to attend to other pressing personal matters. Message of 2009 Jubilee Planning Committee Chair



The theme of the 2009 LIHEDE 5th Anniversary Jubilee is, "Understanding Ourselves and our History: A Call to Unity and Collective Development in Liberia." It is a theme that concerns all patriotic Liberians because it mandates every Liberian and friends of Liberia to reexamine the history and culture of Liberia, and to make meaning of our Liberian citizenship by recognizing the cultural and historical ties that bind us together as one people. This year's theme also awakens us to the reality that in diversity there is oneness or unity of purpose, and it urges us to celebrate our diversity and uniqueness with deep appreciation of and respect for one another.

The 2009 LIHEDE Jubilee on Liberian education, history, culture, and national development is very crucial to peace and unity in Liberia. This is the time to put our national house in order. It is time to pledge allegiance to the Lone Star (flag) of Liberia and not to pledge to any warlords or warring or ethnic factions in Liberia. It is, in essence, a time to iron out sincerely our differences as a people who have had a civil strife and who are now ready to put our bitter experiences behind us in order to forge a bright new future for every Liberian, irrespective of ethnicity, creed, religion, and political and cultural persuasions.

The issues that will be discussed at this Jubilee are at the heart of national reconciliation, rehabilitation, and reconstruction in Liberia. Without an understanding of ourselves, with respect to our own culture and history, and, in terms of who we are, where we come from, and where we are headed, it would be foolhardy of us as a people or race to forge ahead or become forerunners of our own destiny. In addition, it would be meaningless to establish or formulate national development plans when there is no specific cultural or political blueprint to follow.

The lack of a nationally acclaimed or well publicized blue print for national development in Liberia by successive Liberian governments, and the lack of adequate cultural and historical knowledge about Liberia on the part of many Liberians have been the main problems with peace, unity, and meaningful development in Liberia. And for those of us who are culturally and historically aware, our words of wisdom have often fallen on deaf ears. Hence, it is difficult for the national leadership of Liberia to provide culturally and historically-relevant development plans and activities for the people of Liberia if the minds of our leaders are not in tune with Liberian cultural heritage.

Therefore knowing ourselves as Liberians will enable Liberian educational leaders and policymakers to draw out a culturally-relevant instructional plan and curriculum for post-conflict Liberia and provide locally-produced textbooks and instructional materials that will address holistically the educational and intellectual needs of educators and learners alike. In hindsight, this year's jubilee theme seeks to propel every Liberian in one specific direction—to develop love for Liberia, self, and one's fellow countrymen and women by putting the best interest of Liberia first before our individual interests, contrary to how many Liberians nowadays are putting self-interest above the interest of Liberia.

Thus, in order to reverse this negative national custom in the governance of Liberia and its people, it is imperative that we first know ourselves and our history so that we may be on the same national page and in order for us to succeed as a nation and people. But unfortunately today, we as Liberians are not on the same page because our allegiance is split among various political, social, economic, and factional interests, to the utter neglect of the overall and best interest of Liberia. This year's LIHEDE Jubilee will be thought-provoking and free of ethnic and factional biases and prejudices because the best interest of the Liberian nation and people will be the centerpiece of discussion and genuine concern during our deliberations. I believe this year's jubilee will also make a big difference in how we view ourselves as Liberians and how we relate to one another after the LIHEDE Jubilee has ended, because we intend to follow up with authorities in Liberia and the international community regarding the issues we will raise and discuss so that they may be fully implemented to the letter. Welcome to the 2009 LIHEDE 5th Anniversary Jubilee.

Executive Director's Jubilee Message . . .



On this occasion of the 5th anniversary jubilee of LIHEDE, I want to express profound thanks and appreciation to all of you for your continued support and generous contributions to the works of LIHEDE. Without your moral, financial, and professional or technical support, it would have been impossible for LIHEDE to become the strong presence it is today within the Diaspora Liberian community in the U.S., and generally in the U.S. and Liberia. I especially want to thank my wife Mary for standing by my side and supporting me throughout my leadership of LIHEDE, and to my fellow co-founders, Messrs Nat Galarea Gbessagee and Siahyonkron Nyanseor, for helping me turn an idea into a practical reality.

Indeed, when I contacted Messrs Gbessagee and Nyanseor in late 2002 to help me plan the official launch of my book, "Nyanyan Ghomanan: History, Migration, and Government of the Bassa," I had no idea that that collaboration would have ended up in the establishment of LIHEDE. But it turned out that instead of planning only a mere book launching program, we decided to plan a symposium on "African Governance and Philosophical Thought" at which the book would be launched, since the central theme of my book dealt with the governing processes of the Bassa people of Liberia. The symposium, held for two days on the campus of North Carolina A&T State University in April 2003, was so successful and well-attended by Liberian academicians, historians, professionals, students, and ordinary persons that we decided to form an organization devoted to the promotion of education, history, and development in Liberia, since the three of us were born in Liberia and share a common Liberian heritage. So it was that we met in Mr. Gbessagee's hotel room here in Greensboro, North Carolina on April 18, 2003 to brainstorm on the mission, goal, and scope of operation of what is today LIHEDE, and the rest is now history.

I can therefore state without hesitation that I do take pride in joining two other sons of Liberia to form LIHEDE. Though only into its 5th year of existence, LIHEDE has become what we wanted it to be—a widely recognized professional, respectable, and results-oriented organization operating in the U.S. and Liberia. This is the great honor and achievement we celebrate today. This honor or achievement is also not too surprising to us because we originally set out with much determination and zeal to succeed and make a difference in the lives of our compatriots in Liberia. And though we in LIHEDE have yet to reach the level of success we hope to achieve, there is no doubt in my mind that LIHEDE has already made a difference in the lives of Liberians in Liberia through its malaria eradication campaign, Liberian studies initiative, and related health conferences and training workshops.

Today, I would like to publicly record few of LIHEDE' contributions to reconstruction efforts in post-conflict Liberia. Under my leadership, LIHEDE accepted the challenge in 2005 to fight malaria in Liberia, as malaria is one of the most insidious, but preventable disease that kills up to 2-3 million people worldwide. The World Health Organization estimates that an African child dies from malaria every 30 seconds, while the number of malaria-related deaths in Liberia is estimated at 21,500 annually, according to Liberian health officials. The LIHEDE malaria eradication campaign began with a symposium on malaria treatment and control on the camps of NC A&T in 2005, a national health conference in Monrovia, Liberia in 2006, and several malaria awareness workshops and seminars within African communities across the U.S. and Liberia. Eventually, a combination of these symposiums and workshops, including a letter writing campaign to U.S. leaders, resulted in Liberia's inclusion on the list of funding recipients for malaria treatment and control under the U.S. government's President Malaria Initiatives (PMI). The U.S. government, through the U.S. Embassy in Monrovia, acknowledged LIHEDE's role in Liberia getting PMI funding by inviting a LIHEDE delegation at the Embassy in 2006 to witness via satellite the official announcement by President George W. Bush of Liberia's inclusion on the PMI funding list. Liberia did receive \$37.5 million under

the PMI funds, and another \$37.5 from the Global Fund for malaria treatment, control, and prevention in Liberia. LI-HEDE is not a direct beneficiary of these fundings but the Liberian government and people.

Again, in 2004, LIHEDE proposed a comprehensive Liberian Studies Program that was shared with the Liberian government and leaders of higher institutions of learning in Liberia. LIHEDE later signed a memorandum of understanding each with the United Methodist University and the African Methodist Episcopal University in 2005 to begin offering a baccalaureate program in Liberian Studies, but the project is yet to materialize. However, the idea caught on and LIHEDE's Director of Education and Culture/Liberian Studies Project, Dr. Adetokunbo Borishade, was recruited by Cuttington University College in Liberia to launch a new Africana and Liberian Studies Program during the 2008-2009 academic year. One of Liberia's indigenous languages, Kpelle, is now an elective course at the University of Liberia, as LIHEDE continues to advocate for a new national curriculum in Liberia that will make the teaching of Liberian language and culture mandatory in all Liberian grade schools, middle schools, high schools, and colleges, in order to foster unity, cooperation, and understanding amongst the sixteen major ethnic groups of Liberia.

All of these initiatives exemplify LIHEDE's commitment to excellence in the service of humanity, especially people in the war-ravaged country of Liberia. I especially want to express thanks and appreciation to the dedicated efforts of the men and women who make up LIHEDE, for trusting me and helping me to make yesterday's dreams become today's reality. This is certainly a cause for LIHEDE to celebrate. And with a humble sense of pride I write to acknowledge and rejoice at the collective and individual efforts of all officers, members, and sympathizers of LIHEDE that bring us to this moment—the fifth anniversary of LIHEDE.I anticipate that this alliance will last forever in love of Liberia as we continued to maintain the character, leadership, and trust that have enabled LIHEDE to achieve what it is today. I can now look to the future with you with much dynamism and commitment as we gather here today to celebrate and launch the trajectory of LIHEDE's next five to ten-year development plan. As part of that plan, LIHEDE would like to establish a special education high school in Liberia to cater to the children of Liberia ravaged by war. Purpose and Goals of LIHEDE 2009 5th Anniversary Jubilee
